We are deeply grateful for the collective support that allowed us to surpass our goals and further our organization's mission of protecting and restoring the Soque River and its watershed!





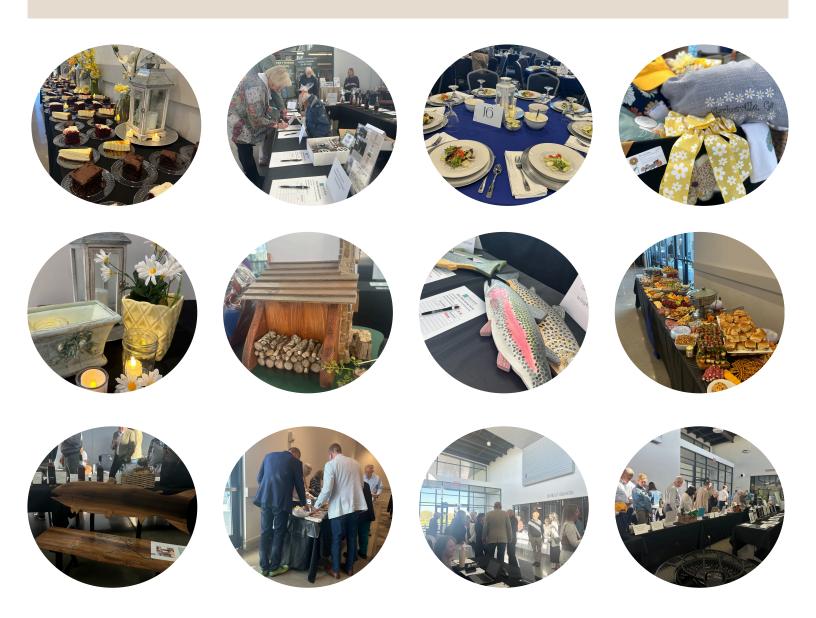
SRW) A Board Meeting Recap & Spring Successes!

Last month's SRWA board meeting was a resounding success, filled with productive discussions and forward-thinking planning. We're thrilled to share a glimpse into some recent projects that showcase the tangible impact of our collective efforts.

Partnering with Piedmont University, our team witnessed students planting 40 shrubs on the campus wetland on April 17th, contributing to habitat restoration and ecological education.

Just two days later, on April 19th, we orchestrated the planting of 75 trees and 50 shrubs along a Goshen Creek property, further enhancing the riparian zone and improving water quality. Additionally, we collaborated with local freshwater fly-fishing property owners who generously invested in planting over 50 trees to establish a new buffer on their land, demonstrating a shared commitment to environmental stewardship.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our members and supporters, whose unwavering dedication fuels our ability to make a real difference in the watershed. It is through your contributions and belief in our mission that we can implement these impactful projects, fostering a healthier and more vibrant environment for all.

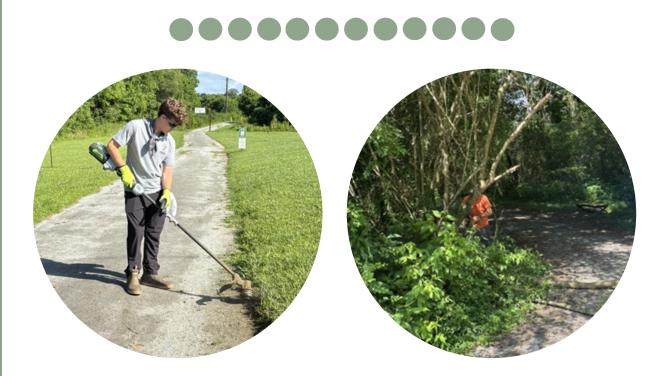


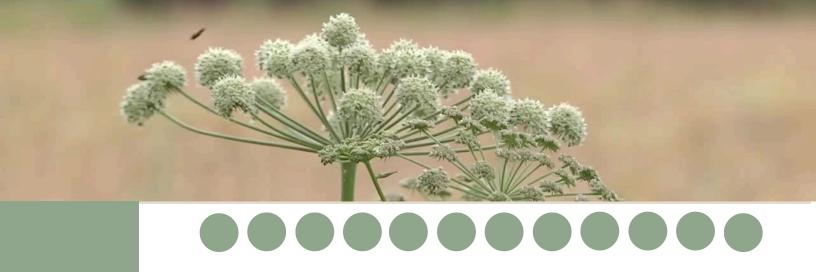
Soque Greenway Trail Thriving Thanks to Community Effort!

They are there right now on the needles, sucking the life out of your trees. For those of you that have treated your hemlocks, it should be comforting to know that the adelgids on your tree will die and you will not see those white egg sacks next spring.

The station is also Northeast Georgia's home of the Georgia Bulldogs, an assortment of great weekend shows and the newly established local hit, "The Mountain Morning Show" with Cole Cleiman and Darrell Everidge.

Cole Cleiman and his mother, Catherine, purchased WCHM in the Fall of 2024. WCHM was in desperate need of a revamp and the Cleiman family saw the perfect opportunity to give back to their community.

Cole, a Clarkesville native and former talk show co-host, had the dream of creating a locally focused, positive, uplifting morning show. Darrell Everidge, a well-known award-winning radio producer and broadcast specialist, returned to WCHM to embark on this new endeavor. Cole and Darrell quickly gained traction with "The Mountain Morning Show" by hosting a variety of unique guests, political leaders (both National and hometown politicians) local business owners, the animal shelter and local non-profit groups.

Cleiman, being an avid outdoorsman as well, created a strong connection with the Soque River Watershed Association (SRWA) by hosting them regularly on the show. WCHM has contributed to the SRWA through fund raising and donated air-time to educate the community of their importance.

Along with the SRWA, WCHM also supports the local veteran's organizations, the VFW, DAV and American Legion through a show called, "Veteran's Voices", which airs every weekend.

Cleiman and Everidge both plan to keep growing and contribute to the community by delivering a positive, light-hearted place to stay informed with news and information. SRWA Grant Writing: The Ultimate Experience

As the SRWA Team continues to evolve as a working board, the learning curve has resembled a 90-degree angle...and that challenge involves grant writing! Like most non-profits, fundraisers have their limitations in driving adequate funding for major river work and water testing projects, so grant writing efforts are a must.Recently, the SRWA completed several new grant submissions involving an application for a 2024 regional seed grant and a 2025 EPA 319 grant request. Since these were our first grant writing efforts the organization's expectations were low - but to our surprise we did have some initial success.

As of the first week of June, the SRWA will have access to 319 grant funding in the amount of \$75,000 that will be partially utilized to re-write the original 2008 and revised 2017 Soque River Watershed Protection Plans (WPP) and new water quality testing projects. The river and watershed have gone through so many changes over the last eight to seventeen years that a full re-write project was fully warranted. The key element missing was how the SRWA would be able to pay for it! That question as now been answered.

Beginning in July 2025, a third-party environmental firm, Resource Environmental Solutions (RES) with a satellite office based in Athens, Georgia will be updating our current WPP with an end of September 2025 completion date.

As Board President, I would like to personally thank several volunteers and board members that have played a key role in delivering this monumental achievement.

Let me thank our supporters within the Habersham County Management/Financial Team (Tim Sims, Sara Burke, and Kiana Holden), Mary Gazaway with the Georgia EPD Watershed Protection Branch, grant writers Nora Almazan and Rick Coulon, former SRWA ED, Duncan Hughes, and board member, Mike Watts. Projects of this type are total team efforts...thanks everyone!

At this point, the SRWA will have a new watershed vision for the future as early as September, but the funding for new projects will require a continued grant writing effort. 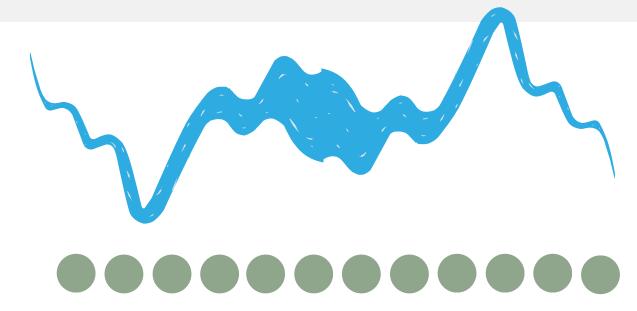
Meet Leah Holtzclaw: Our SRWA Student Intern Making Waves!
